MILLCREEK. The city's first official flat was adopted by the City Council earlier this week. The design has been presented to the Council in various configurations and options for the last several months with the original design presentation from the Millcreek Youth Council.

The adopted version is a blue field interlaid with green mountains in the shape of a broad letter "M" that is capped with white snow and edged by a flowing creek of water with a white emblem of a mill wheel in the foreground.



The flag follows the design guidelines set out in [vexillology](#), the study of flags, which indicate that a city flag should be recognizable from a distance and reflect attributes of the city.

- The new Millcreek flag reflects the colors of the city logo:
 - The blue sky symbolizes the hope and vision of a new city, where the sky is the limit to the community's potential.
 - The white snow on the mountains represents the winter season and recreation beloved by the residents of Millcreek and the integrity and transparency that they expect from their municipal government.
 - The green color of the mountains represents the community's prosperity and the hope in the youth of the city.
- The mountains represent the beautiful Wasatch Range of the Rocky Mountains that watch protectively over the city of Millcreek, specifically Grandeur Peak and Mountain Olympus. The mountains in the shape of the letter "M" represent the name of the city: "Millcreek."
- The flowing creek represents primarily the city's namesake: Mill Creek, and secondarily the other waterways important to the city's topography: the Jordan River, Big Cottonwood Creek, Parley's Creek, and the many historic canals and irrigation ditches. It also represents the city's forward

motion, flowing towards progress.

- The mill wheel is an homage to the city's deep heritage and past, not only of the mills built along the creek in the pioneering era of the Nineteenth Century, the the effort that led to the industry of today. The ten spokes on the mill wheel represent the ten significant ethnicities and nations that settled in Millcreek:
 - The Goshutes
 - The Shoshones
 - The Utes
 - Mormon Pioneers
 - Pacific Islanders
 - Europeans
 - Hispanics
 - Africans
 - Asians
 - Future settlers of Millcreek

The overall sky, snow, mountains, and flowing water embody the city's motto of "Connected by Nature" — representing both the community's love for the nature environment and desire for connecting with it, as well as the community and community-minded connectedness that comes naturally to Millcreek residents, businesses, and visitors.



TIME TO VOTE - IT'S EASY

MILLCREEK. Millcreek's Salt Lake County ballot drop box is located on the north end of Millcreek Common (approximately 1354 E Chambers Avenue) between the Granite Credit Union Adventure Hub and the new Millcreek City Hall on Chambers Avenue. Voted ballots may be dropped off there, in any Salt Lake County drop box in the county, or in the U.S. mail (postmarked on or before November 20, 2023). A mail-in ballot may also be forfeited in lieu of in-person voting at any county voting center.

On November 21st, Millcreek's election day voting center will be the Millcreek Library at 2266 E Evergreen Avenue from 7am-8pm. Locations of drop boxes and early voting centers may be found on the Salt Lake County Clerk's website, <https://slco.org/clerk/elections/>.




